WMO and UNEP as host institutions of the IPCC have worked closely over the last year to put in place senior management compacts for Secretary Abdallah Mokssit and Deputy Secretary Ermira Fida to guide the efficient functioning, responsibilities and deliverables of the management and staff of the secretariat. These are based on the accountability documents for the senior officials of the UN Secretariat. The professionality and dedication of the secretariat is very clear and is key to IPCC Support to the scientific community in the delivery of the assessment cycle they have worked hard and long hours to ensure that the plenary meetings are well prepared and excellent supported

We would like to express our sincere thanks to the outgoing Chair Dr Lee and all the ExCom, for their dedication to the bureau and of course all the thousands of dedicated professional scientists from institutions around the world who make the IPCC the 'gold standard of scientific excellence.

We would like to thank the Government of Kenya and UNON and UNEP (Including the Early Warning and Assessment division) for hosting this important meeting and we wish you well and success in the election of the new chair and Bureau for the 7th cycle.

IPCC is vital for the planet and for humankind and your work is the key to ensuring we stay on a sustainable and track for the future.
